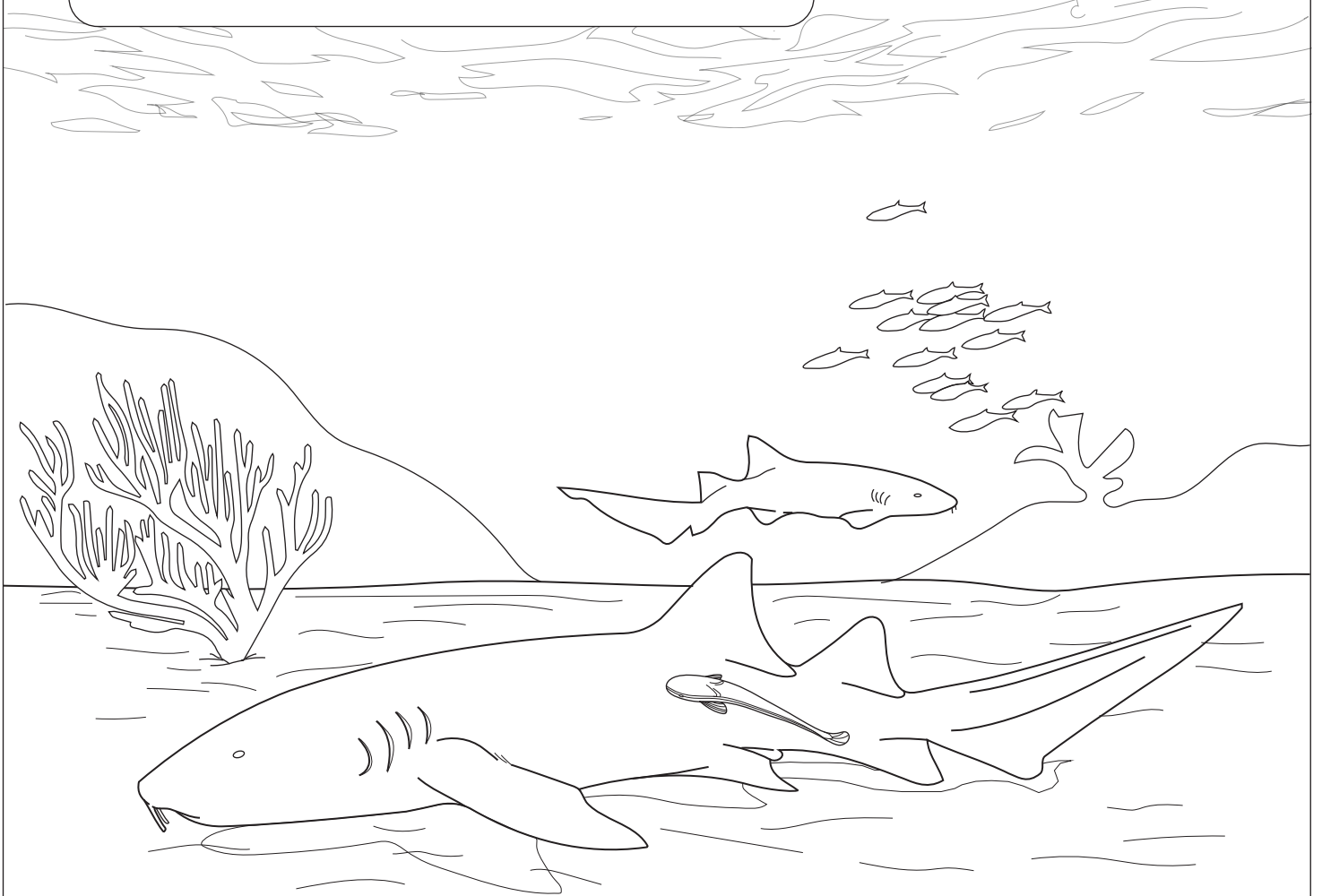

Ginglymostoma cirratum

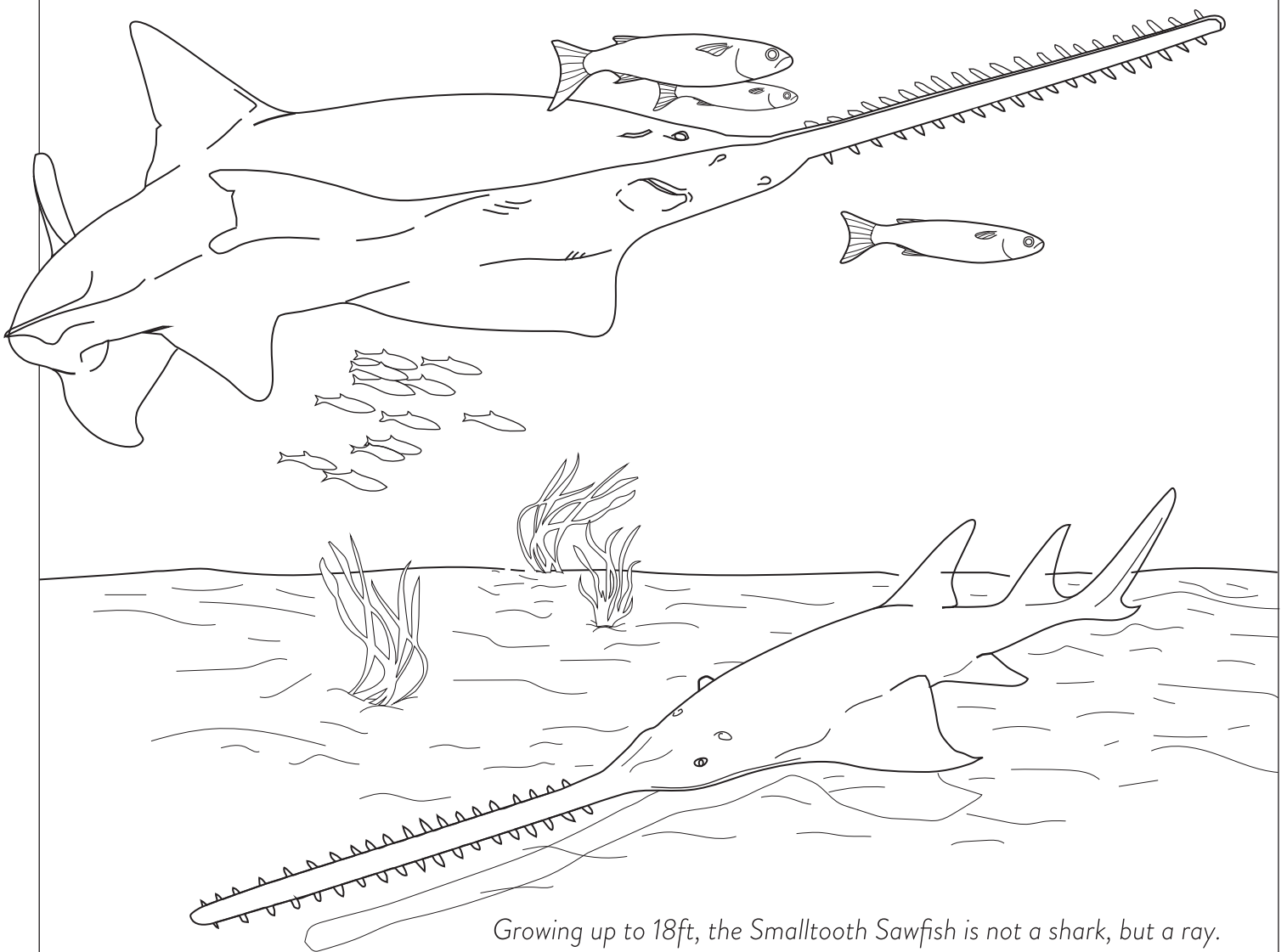

Pristis pectinata



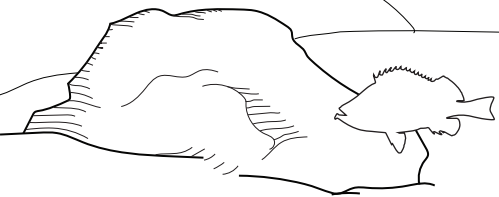
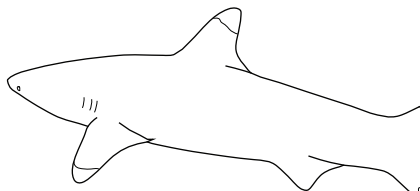
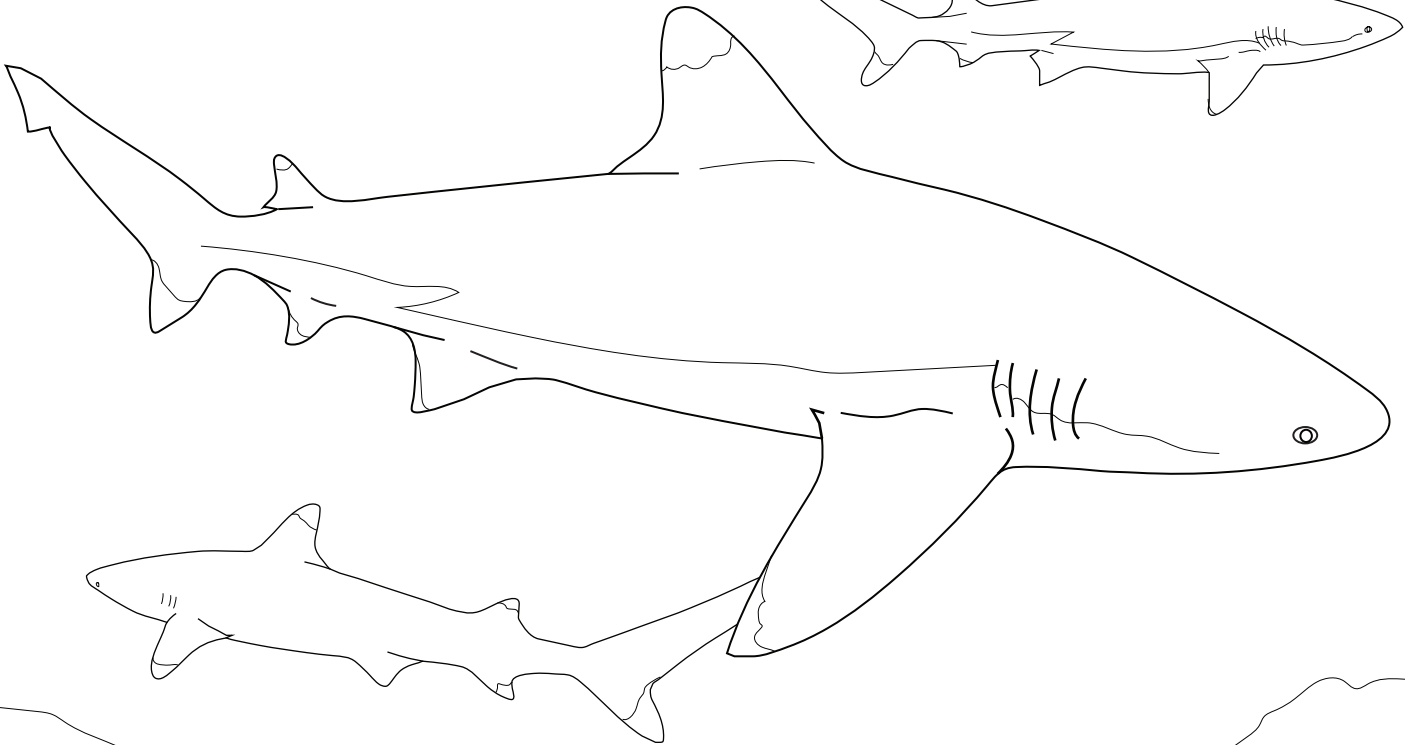
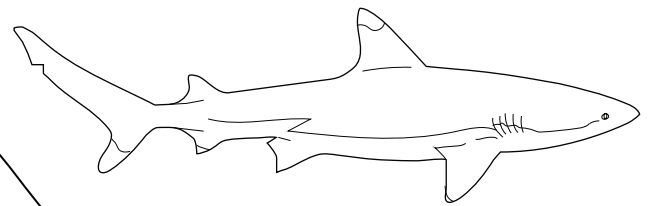
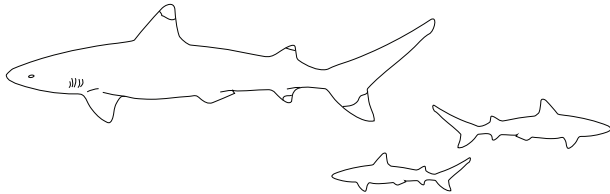

BLACKTIP

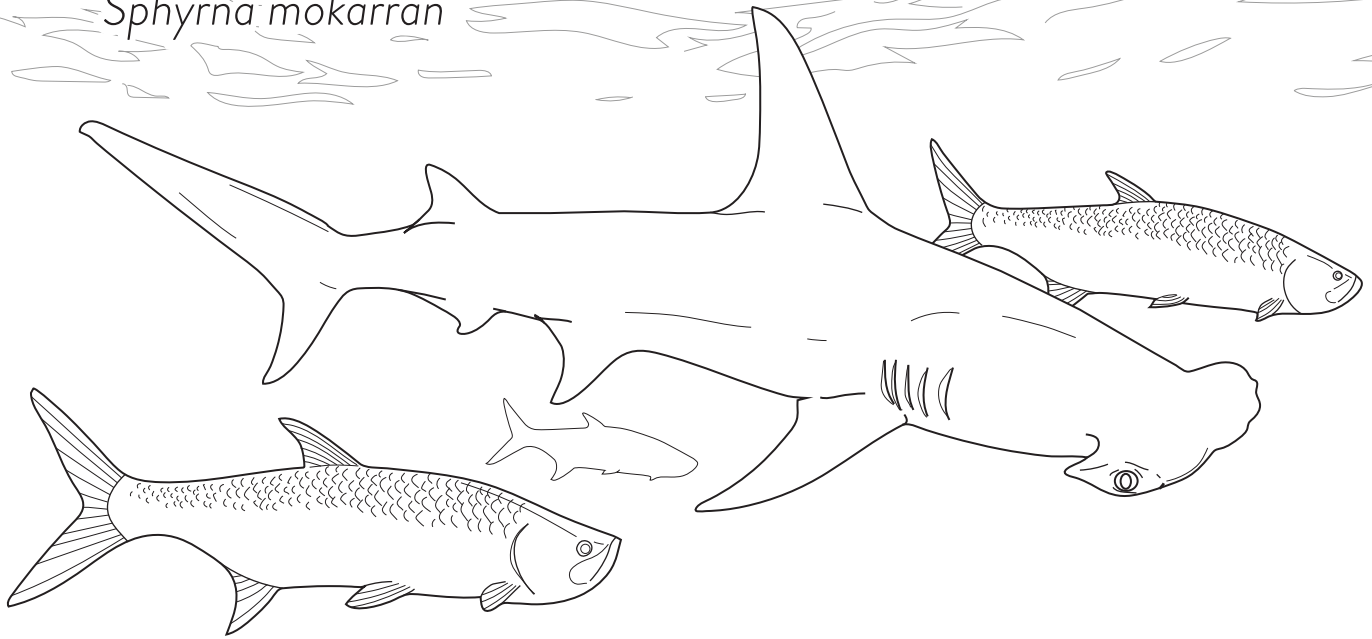

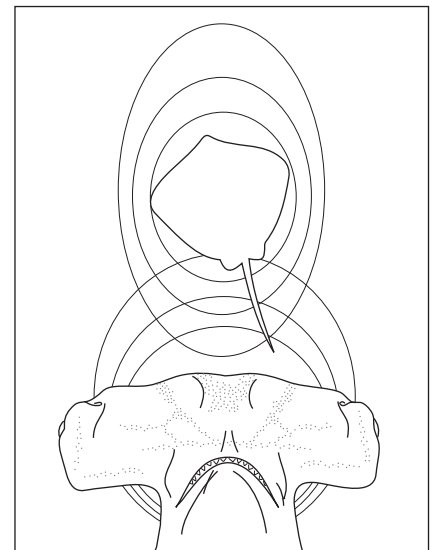
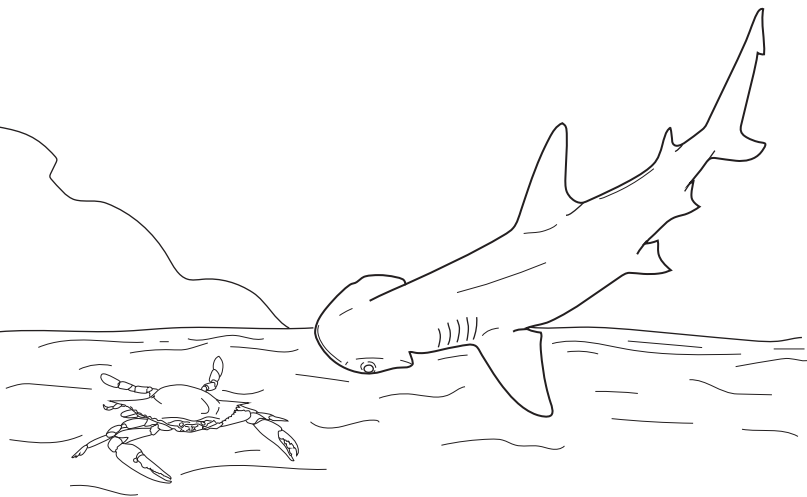
Every year, January through March, thousands of Blacktip Sharks meet up off the coast of Palm Beach County as they travel south. These migrating sharks help keep reefs healthy by clearing out weak and injured fish, controlling populations.
